Banana "Ice Cream"

Servings:4 Serving Size:1 scoop (1/4 cup)



Ingredients:
2 bananas, sliced and frozen
2 tablespoons milk
Toppings (optional)

Directions:

Peel and slice bananas, place in freezer bag and freeze overnight. Blend banana pieces and milk in blender until smooth and creamy. (Turn blender off and shake or stir periodically if pieces aren't blending). It might take a few minutes for it to become the consistency of soft serve ice cream. Enjoy!

Notes:

You can mix in a handful of sliced strawberries, a tablespoon of peanut butter, or a teaspoon of coconut flakes for a different flavor.

KFGC Field Day-Makers Mark Farm-August 13th

The Kentucky Forage and Grassland Council Field Day will be held Tuesday August 13 at Star Hill Farm from 4:30-7:30EDT in Loretto, Kentucky. Participants will see and learn about grazing warm season cover crops, rotational grazing, native warm season grasses and pollinator production as well as sorghum production for syrup and silage. UK Extension Specialists highlight forage production innovations at the farm at multiple tour stops.

Star Hill Farm is the home of Maker's Mark Distillery. Star Hill consists of approximately 1200 acres near Loretto in Marion County Kentucky. Approximately 300 acres of the farm is utilized to grow wheat and barley for use in Maker's Mark innovation products. Additionally, the farm is home to production of vegetables, fruit, lamb, Wagyu beef, sorghum, honey, mushrooms and truffles for use at the Distillery's restaurant.

Makers Mark has a strong commitment to the environment and sustainability. An important part of this is practicing regenerative agriculture to improve and restore soil and capture carbon. The principles of regenerative agriculture includes utilization of no-till planting, planting cover crops on fields after harvest, and grazing the cover crops to cycle nutrients back into the soil. Star Hill Farm has been certified by "Regenified," an international organization that conducts on-site audits to determine that an entity is meeting all of the standards for Regenerative Agriculture.

Come learn more about grazing strategies and regenerative agriculture! A meal prepared by the Makers Mark restaurant will be provided for participants at the end of the field day. For those interested, an opportunity for a tour of the distillery and bourbon tasting will be available prior to the field day (limited number). Registration is \$20. 


Summer Heat Safety

Summer heat arrived with a bang in mid-June across Kentucky! Unfortunately, we are only getting started with the summer season - there will most certainly be several months of hot weather ahead. Summer is also the season when everyone wants to be outside, either working or having fun. As much as we love this time of year, it is also a very dangerous season.

Heat continues to be the deadliest form of weather across the country. Higher than flooding, tornadoes, and hurricanes. Sadly, statistics for last year showed a higher-than-average fatality rate. Heat related deaths have been creeping up every year for the last few years.



During excessive heat, avoid heavy activity and direct sunlight. Stay hydrated, find a cool indoor place, and check on children, the elderly, and pets. Protect yourself outside by wearing light, loose-fitting clothes, stay hydrated, and spend time in the shade. Also, never leave anyone (or pets) alone in a locked car, even in the winter, as death can occur in as little as 10 minutes.

Know the signs:

- Heat Exhaustion: Becoming faint or dizzy, excessive sweating, cool/clammy skin, nausea, rapid/weak pulse, muscle cramps.
- **Heat Stroke:** Throbbing headache, no sweating, red/hot/dry skin, nausea, rapid/strong pulse, possible loss of consciousness.

If someone experiences these symptoms, get them to a cooler place and try to cool the body (loosen clothing, drink cool water, etc.). If it's a heat stroke, call 911 IMMEDIATELY.
